We typically have late buses on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays.


We offer a wide range of activities and clubs including-

Advanced Classes

- Open access to honors classes
 - (Exception - Algebra 1 HN)
- Students may choose honors English, Math, and Science classes.
 - All 7th-grade students take honors History.
- Similar curriculum as Level IV Center classes
 - Rigorous academic program using extensions to the Program of Studies












IB Writing Tasks

7th grade will focus on expository writing with the goal of teaching students strong paragraph structure. Students will learn how to write with elaboration and specificity. We will also focus on using text evidence in writing. Students will learn to study the fiction and nonfiction genres in depth. Additionally, we will focus on comparing the features of the two genres.

- Quarter 1: Journaling Portfolio - Creative and Analytical Writing
- Quarter 2: Expository Essay Writing and Novel Study
- Quarter 3: Agents of Change - Interdisciplinary Unit with History
- Quarter 4: Literary Analysis of multiple genres

Health and Physical Education


- **Team sports**

- **Primary Focus is on Primary Source Analysis Skills**

- Students learn how to analysis primary sources and then use those skills throughout the year on historical documents, political cartoons and art
- *Panel 61 Art Analysis – Analyze a selection of art from Jacob Lawrence's Migration Series and then create a Panel 61 that bridges the theme of migration into modern day*

- **DBQ- Document Based Question Essay Writing**


- Focus: Writing and Communication of Ideas based on Primary Sources

- **Interdisciplinary Project with English**



Mathematics Options in 7th Grade

Math 7

(7th grade curriculum)
Will take Math 7 SOL

Math 7 Honors

(8th grade curriculum)
Will take Math 8 SOL

Algebra 1 Honors placement requires:
91% on Algebra abilities test AND
500+ on Math 7 SOL
Will take Algebra SOL

Math Sample Tasks

Math 7: Consumer Applications Project - students “order” from a menu and calculate final costs after applying discounts, tax, and tip.

Math 7H: Party Functions Project - students research different party venues then compare their costs using linear functions.

Algebra 1H: Food Truck Activity - students use systems of equations to determine costs and describe situations in designing their own Food Truck .

Algebra 1 HN - Enrollment Requirements

- Advanced math curriculum during 6th grade
 - 91st percentile on Iowa math assessment
 - 500 or higher (pass advanced) on Math 7 SOL
- *pending

Letters about Algebra placement are sent in early summer.

**Note - 6th grade teacher recommendation is not a criteria,*

The class is a high school credit.

Support Classes

- Math
- Reading

Reading Support Classes

- Semester and Year-long Support
- Research-based Programs to build skills
- Small class sizes
- Incentives and contests specific to Reading Support classes



English Language Learners

- Serves students with a home language other than English
- Classes for beginning English learners focused on language acquisition
- Team-taught content classes using strategies to support upper level English learners

Special Education

- Small group classes and team-taught content classes using interventions and accommodations to support Individualized Education Plans (IEPs)
- Focused reading classes
- Study Skills/Executive Functioning/Personal Development electives
